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YS Schools Facilities Survey

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Introduction

WHAT: The YS Schools Facilities Survey 2023, conducted from May 8th to May 15th, 2023, successfully drew participation from a significant portion of the Yellow Springs community. In total, 711 individuals – accounting for slightly over a fifth of the village's population – completed the survey (note: 35 of these respondents were non-residents of the village). The robust response to the survey, one of the largest response rates of any survey undertaken in YS in the last few years, suggests the community's deep concern and active interest in shaping the future of our local schools.

WHY: This survey served as a conduit for gathering diverse opinions on the pressing issues concerning the YS School Facilities. Its primary purpose was to provide the School Board with a comprehensive body of community feedback as it deliberates on which course of action for the facilities to proceed with. Furthermore, it was intended to support the community with reliable, fact-based information about the proposed options.

The survey's aim goes beyond the immediate decision-making process. By inviting the community's input, The YS Community Foundation which sponsored this survey, hopes to foster open dialogue about issues like this one, crucial to Yellow Springs' future. The survey is also a mechanism to cultivate a collaborative spirit, underscoring the importance of active listening to each other's views and voices, and to strive for inclusive participation in considering options for the community's public education infrastructure.

HOW: The survey was disseminated widely to maximize participation (through post cards sent to all villagers, engagement of community members and organizations to encourage participation, notices posted around town, articles about the survey and letters to newspaper, etc.), with a focus on gathering perspectives from a broad cross-section of the community. While the survey results show a very good mixture of socio-economic diversity, despite significant outreach efforts, racial diversity was relatively small with only 26 or 3.75% of the total respondents, self-identifying as Black/African Americans. Notably, the percentage of Black/African Americans in Yellow Springs is approximately 10 percent of the population.

Please note that in reviewing respondents' preference data about the four options, you will see numbers that exceed the number of total respondents. This is because respondents were invited to share multiple preferences if they had them (i.e., people might say they strongly preferred two options).

Embracing a mixed-method approach, the survey included quantitative measures (such as ratings and rankings) and qualitative methods (like analysis through tagging and summarizing answers to open-ended questions, like the vision question). This blend of techniques may provide for complex and nuanced understandings of the community's views, attitudes, and preferences. Further data analysis may be undertaken in the future to get even more depth and nuance from the data.

Moving forward, the YS Community Foundation intends to use the survey results as a springboard for future community engagement. The Foundation plans to facilitate ongoing discussions and forums, promoting a collaborative approach to decision-making in general in our town. By reinforcing the importance of every voice in the community, the Foundation hopes to strengthen a culture of active participation and consensus-building in Yellow Springs.

The YSCF will wait to learn what the Yellow Springs Exempted Village School District Board decides regarding a levy option before determining the viability, funding requirements and mechanics of a possible Leave No Resident Behind fund.



Also, due to the sensitivity about researcher's bias, we put 100 randomly selected responses into the chat bot and requested a one-page summary. We then edited the vision statement for clarity, coherence, and fidelity to the original responses.





The results are summarized below in order that they were presented in the survey.

Please note: the summaries of the preference data were created with assistance from an AI chat bot (ChatGPT). We then edited the summaries of the preference data for clarity, coherence, and fidelity to the original responses.

A1 - favored by 253 respondents (36.19%)

Based on the provided preference data for option A1, here is a summary of the key points related to school design, environmental impact, potential learning disruptions, impact on Mills Lawn grounds, and cost:

- 1. School Design: Provides for the renovation of existing buildings instead of constructing new ones. Keeping Mills Lawn as a separate grade school facility is a preferred feature. There are concerns about mixing very young with older students.
- 2. Environmental Impact: Renovating and reusing existing buildings is seen as a more environmentally sound option compared to new construction. Some individuals express the importance of conservation of resources and minimizing waste.
- Potential Learning Disruptions: Renovations would happen in phases over 18 months and "swing space" would be provided as needed. Keeping elementary students separate from middle and high school students is desired. Preference is expressed for keeping a more intimate learning environment, especially for younger students at MLS.
- 4. Impact on Mills Lawn Grounds: Preserving Mills Lawn as a grade school facility and maintaining the green space is a priority for many.
- 5. Cost: Affordability is a significant factor for the community. Option A1 is preferred for being the most costeffective choice. Some individuals express concerns about tax increases and the financial burden on residents, particularly those on fixed incomes.

Overall, the data indicates those who prefer option A1 do so because of its focus on cost-effectiveness, renovation of existing buildings, and preservation of Mills Lawn as a separate grade school facility with green space. Environmental impact and potential learning disruptions are also important considerations for the community.

B2 - favored by 240 respondents (34.19%)

Based on the provided preference data for option B2, here is a summary of the key points related to school design, environmental impact, potential learning disruptions, impact on Mills Lawn grounds, and cost:

- 1. School design: Option B2 is favored because it allows for interaction between all grades and provides a modern, safe, and sound learning environment. It is seen as a long-term solution that addresses the needs of the schools for generations. It is preferred over renovating or maintaining the existing buildings.
- 2. Environmental impact: There is no specific data provided regarding the environmental impact of Option B2.
- 3. Potential learning disruptions: Option B2 is preferred because it minimizes disruptions to students during construction. It is seen as a less disruptive option compared to other alternatives.
- 4. Impact on Mills Lawn grounds: Some individuals express support for repurposing the Mills Lawn property for other uses, such as affordable housing or community spaces. However, there are also concerns about losing the Mills Lawn site if Option B2 is chosen.
- 5. Cost: Option B2 is seen as the most cost-effective in the long run. Maintaining multiple buildings is viewed as wasteful, and a single campus is seen as a more efficient use of resources and facilities.

Overall, the data indicates those who prefer option B2 do so because of its efficiency, potential cost savings, and the belief that a new building would provide a better learning environment for students. There is also some support for repurposing the Mills Lawn property and taking advantage of state funds for construction.

X - favored by 274 respondents (39.03%)

Based on the provided preference data for option X, here is a summary of the key points related to school design, environmental impact, potential learning disruptions, impact on Mills Lawn grounds, and cost:

- 1. School Design: Option X is seen as an integrative solution combining attributes of both B2 and A1, and the most viable option for meeting the needs of teachers and students. It is favored over Option A1, which is considered short-term and insufficient for addressing the educational needs.
- 2. Environmental Impact: Option X is preferred as it includes state reimbursement from OFCC, which helps offset long-term costs to tax payers and promotes sustainable, energy-efficient building practices based on required Leed-Silver environmental standards. Renovation-only options are seen as delaying the inevitable need for new facilities.
- 3. Potential Learning Disruptions: Option X is viewed as minimizing disruptions to students during construction compared to other options with a minimal need for swing space. Renovation-only options are seen as insufficient in addressing the logistical concerns and needs of educators and would cause much learning disruption.
- 4. Impact on Mills Lawn Grounds: Option X is supported by those who value the preservation of Mills Lawn as an elementary school, and by many who support a new Pre-K program. It is preferred over other options that involve demolishing or significantly altering the Mills Lawn site.
- 5. Cost: Option X receives state funding and reimbursement. It is seen as a better long-term use of residents' tax money compared to renovation-only options.

Overall, the data indicates those who prefer option X do so because it addresses the needs of teachers, students, and the community. It offers the potential for new, sustainable school buildings while also preserving the Mills Lawn grounds. The inclusion of pre-K education is seen as a positive aspect, and the possibility of state reimbursement is highly valued. Cost-effectiveness and long-term sustainability are important factors influencing the preference for Option X.

C6 - favored by 230 respondents (33.05%)

Based on the provided preference data for Option C6, here is a summary of the key points related to school design, environmental impact, potential learning disruptions, impact on Mills Lawn grounds, and cost:

- 1. School design: Many respondents express concerns about combining all grades into one building as with B2. They mention traffic issues, limited parking, and maturity differences between younger and older students. They thus advocate for separate facilities for grades 1-5 and 6-12.
- 2. Environmental impact: A number of respondents emphasize the importance of LEED-certified buildings and express a preference for options that bring LEED certification to the middle and high school buildings.
- 3. Potential learning disruptions: Some respondents believe that maintaining separate spaces for different age groups is important. They also believe the new build at Enon Road would minimize learning disruptions there as the new building would be done next to the old one.
- 4. Impact on Mills Lawn grounds: Many respondents value the Mills Lawn school and its central location in the heart of town. Some respondents are opposed to options that would repurpose or lease the Mills Lawn property for non-school use.
- 5. Cost: Many respondents express a preference for options that take advantage of state reimbursement to mitigate the financial burden on the community and make a long-term investment in schools. Renovation-only options are generally seen as less favorable due to concerns about long-term costs and the need for more comprehensive updates.

Overall, the data indicates those who prefer option C6 do so because it addresses concerns related to school design, environmental impact, potential disruptions, impact on Mills Lawn, and cost considerations. This option retains Mills Lawn as an elementary school, incorporates LEED certification for the middle and high school, and takes advantage of state reimbursement.

















Q21 What is your age?





Q23 What is your annual income?



Q25 If the levy is on the ballot in November, will you vote in the Election?


